tastic musicians like Jose Delgado Guevera and is just as comfortable behind a piano as she is with a violin.


Burndog Hyena



Burndog Hyena played its first show as a two-piece at a battle of the bands at Vanier Hall in 1983. They received the loudest response even if it was a mixture of boos and yays. Joe Bodner (drums/vocals) and Evan

Symons (guitar but now on bass/vocals) met in a basement cover band in 1980. The basement was host to multitudes of typical high school drinking parties. After the cover band fizzled out, they started doing long crazy jams at Joe's parent's house. Joe's dad, Ed Bodner, was on Prince George city council and ran for mayor. Completed original songs eventually emerged so they bought a four track reel-to-reel and started recording. Brian Halverson (guitar) and Evan grew up together on the Hart Highway and are in the same grade 1 class picture. Brian started joining Joe and Evan for jams more regularly once Evan rented a small cabin at Summit Lake. In 1985, Evan bought his parents house on Northwood Pulp Mill road and built a recording studio. The bass player from the cover band was recruited. Home-made cassettes of songs and experiments were duplicated and given away. Things got complicated once they got serious. Brian was working in camp and everyone else could practice more.

Evan got impatient. Brian left the band. The band never really recovered, but did go on to play shows at Prince George Playhouse, Vanier Hall and Eagles Hall on the Hart Highway. Joe and Evan moved to Vancouver around 1987/1988 separately where they eventually collaborated in the bands "Space Junk", "Uneven Steps" and "Four Food Groups of the Apocalypse". Joe is known affectionately as "Fat Joe Satan" and has also been in the groups "Untooned" and "Vancouver's Shame". Evan has toured extensively as a solo one person band and was also in "Transylvanian Polka" who opened for "The Lines We Drew" at the Art Space in 2006. Brian still lives in Prince George and with Wayne Hughes produces RIP Radio (showcasing music of the deceased) on CFIS 93.1. Brian is also a cook for Activators (a half-way house). Joe lives in Courtenay and Evan does a monthly loop between Vancouver, Texada Island and Prince George. This has allowed Burndog Hyena to reform their project as old men.

Jose Delgado-Guevara



Originally from Costa Rica, Mr. Delgado-Guevara earned his Associate Degree in Music Education from the Conservatory of Castella for the Visual and Performing Arts of Costa Rica, his Bachelors Degree in

music from the University of Costa Rica, and his Masters Degree in viola performance from Western Michigan University. He apprenticed with Gela Dubrova in Morelia, Mexico, before coming to the United States to study with Igor Fedotov. Mr. Delgado-Guevara received his violin teacher training at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee with Darcy Drexler and Mimi Zweig and with Karen-Michele Kimmet at Queens University, Ontario. He was a founding member of La Camerata Latinoamericana in Costa Rica and has also held positions as principal violist in the National Youth Symphony Orchestra of Costa Rica, the

Central American Symphony Orchestra and many other orchestras in France, Costa Rica, and the United States.

He has performed as a soloist with Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas, Andrews University Symphony Orchestra, University of Costa Rica String Orchestra, the Bach Institute of Costa Rica Chamber Orchestra, Fontana Chamber Music Festival, Fernwood Outdoor Music Series, Afternoon of Music in Kalamazoo and Sinfonia Prince George. Mr. Delgado-Guevara was the coordinator of the Andrews University Department of Music Preparatory Program and served as the interim director for the Andrews University Symphony Orchestra for the 2003-2004 Season. He has also served as the Associate Conductor of the Lake Michigan Youth Orchestra in charge of the Prep-Strings.

Mr.Delgado-Guevara was also the violin/viola instructor for the Salvation Army Arts and Education Program in Benton Harbour Michigan. He is the concertmaster for the Prince



Composer-performer Dave Chokroun (Vancouver) and saxophonist, composer, and poet



Jung People



Jung People (/'j??/yuung) is a Canadian instrumental musical group from Calgary, AB. known for their dynamic blend of Post-rock, prog, and ambient minimalism.

Founded in 2011 by childhood friends Bryan Buss and Jordan Bassi after attending the Musicians Institute in Hollywood, CA. Although instrumental, their idealisms and morals regarding Animal Liberation and Social Awareness are displayed heavily into their album art, song titles, T-shirt designs and







online presence. Despite the bands inherent punk-rock spirit, the music plays in contrast with its melodic and positive nature.

By 2014 Jung People had played 100+ gigs across Canada and happily opened for Crystal Castles, Olafur Arnolds, BRAIDS, Rene Hell and Pick A Piper along with playing 2013's SXSW in Austin, TX and Canadian Music Week in Toronto, CA.

Jung People have recently released their first full length studio album entitled 'Gold Bristle' produced by Howard Bilerman (Godspeed You! Black Emperor, Arcade Fire, Bell Orchestre). The band is currently scheduled for Sled Island 2014 and have added Darren Young (upright bass) and Dominique Ma (violin) to the lineup.

Magdalena Kabat



Born and raised in Central Europe: Poland. Mag grew up in a family of musicians, musicologists and songwriters, so she started her adventure with music in early childhood. Up to finishing high school, she

attended two schools full-time: the general education one and the state music school. In those ten years, her focus was flute performance, orchestra, piano, music theory and... horseback riding. After graduating, she spent a year in preparation for the university level music theory. She has a great passion for all subjects related to harmony and modern composing techniques as well as experimental music. Magdalena did her Master's in Music Theory with Composition at the Academy of Music in Cracow in Poland. In her thesis, she focused on the music of the end of the XIX century and the first half of the XX century. The last four and a half years of her life, she spent in the United States, continuing her study in Kansas City MO, majoring in voice, songwriting, jazz, and band. In September 2013 she moved to Prince George, BC. Mag loves new sounds, God, teaching, horses, fun, and Canada!

Drumming is a universal language. Training with Niagara-On-The-Lake, Ontario percussionist Penner MacKay fueled my passion for world percussion. Collecting and learning drums from my travels it al-

ways marvels me that I can sit down with a group I may not be able to converse with and bring forth music. Arriving in PG last year as the Personnel & Production Manager of the PGSO, creating my co-owned business Oak & Thistle, and being a free-lance drummer and instructor, I have wrapped myself in Prince George's music scene and with festivals such as Casse-Tête, PG never ceases to continue inspiring my passion for music.

Nathan Shubert's Pirate Ship



Nathan Shubert's Pirate Ship is a study in contrast; the organic piano juxtaposed with the mechanical, electronic and synthesized. Inspired by Phillip Glass, Erik Satie, and Ryuichi Sakamoto & Alva Noto, 'Moor-

age, Captian, Port & Chambers', the project's second recording, aims to do more with less, focusing on minimal piano compositions. Contrast is taken a step further by creating the

electronic counterpart to the piano from the piano itself and using nonstandard recording techniques and deeply abstracted recordings.

Pg9o9



Pg909 is the name applied to music/sound projects from Oro Barton. He is an electronics instructor and builds homemade analog audio equipment: synths, pedals and sequencers as a hobby. He lives in Prince

George BC and tries to never use a snare drum sound.

Pigeon Breeders



Pigeon Breeders are an experimental trio, started in 2011, specializing in improvised music that incorporates ambient, electroacoustic, noise, and psychedelic elements.

Steeped in the burgeoning Edmonton noise/experimental music community, they developed a unique sound that has been described as "gently unsettling washes of sound ... intelligent, beautiful sonic art".

Catherine Sikora



Saxophonist Catherine Sikora is an improviser and composer originally from West Cork, Ireland and now based in the New York City area. Self taught to begin with, Sikora obtained a degree in jazz per-

formance in England, and then moved to New York to study with master improvisers and unlearn most of what she learnt in college. She stopped performing entirely for 4 years to concentrate on rebuilding her approach from the ground up, and since resuming performance has become a distinctive voice in New York's downtown scene.

Peter Stevenson



The mechanics and acoustics of pianos have fascinated Peter since he was three years old, when he spent his time ignoring his piano teacher and staring under the lid of her grand piano. This fascination has

only grown as he has learned the intricacies of pianos as a piano technician and as an innovative pianist. Peter's compositions and improvisations explore the piano as a whole, focusing on the unique attributes of the instrument's design.

Samuel Stevenson



Samuel Stevenson believes, despite all evidence to the contrary. Spoken word poet, founder of the Nelson Poetry Slam, art therapist, and professional novice. Samuel has written many artist bios, including

ones which boast having shared the stage with countless genius nobodies, as well as internationally renowned poets such as Danny Sherrard and Buddy Wakefield. Recently, Samuel has been believing of poetry as a ladder. Samuel was born in Prince George and currently lives with his wife in an old cedar shiplap home in Winlaw, BC.

Lisa Toon



Lisa Toon lives in Prince George with her husband and four young boys. While busy with this season of life and being committed to the artistry of being 'Mom,' music and expression have always been vital

to her experience of journeying through life. In fact, her love of music and people led her to past studies of Jazz and Music Therapy in Vancouver. Being involved with various bands and

different types of music communities from classical, jazz, folk rock, and experimental, Lisa has always acknowledged and respected the endless mystery of sound and music. These days she does more listening than playing, and regularly invites her children into musical instincts through 'dance parties' at home. Lisa would like to consider Case-Tête as a musical breath, one that she hopes will be a personal turning point that invites more intentionality in sharing of her music, and a breath that enjoys the 'here and the now' and more time for music in the future as the artistry of 'Mom' evolves.

Panel Discussion

This year's festival features a Panel Discussion on the theme of "the importance and unimportance of technique: technique/s and my artistic practice." The participants will share with the audience about the relation of their artistic practice to "technique" or "techniques." Conventional or othodox traditions of western music-making have often defined themselves in terms of, or otherwise depended on, prescriptive ideas about instrumental technique that were (and are)

inextricable from the horizons of what is to be considered musical. It is pertinent to examine the relationships between the technical approaches we as musicians and composers take and the "other" musicalities we thereby simultaneously embrace.

The participants are Catherine Sikora, Stanley Jason Zappa, Nick Skrowaczewski, Dave Chokroun, Jonathon Wilcke, Jose Delgado-Guevara; the moderator is Jeremy Stewart.

The Piano Drop

Every year, hundreds, if not thousands, of pianos are taken to the dump. We are at a unique point in history when the old uprights from the

beginning of the 20th century and the short, cheap pianos made in the 1960s are generally falling apart and becoming unserviceable.

In my work as a piano technician, I frequently encounter pianos like this. They are often beloved by their owners, who cannot bring themselves to take their pianos to the dump. Instead, the pianos are too often passed along to other unsuspecting piano lovers who must make the difficult decision themselves.

Therefore, I am often looking for ways of honouring the beautiful lives of these pianos and their makers. I began a recycling program so that the metal parts can get reused in other products. I have encouraged several owners to turn their pianos into furniture or art pieces.

The piano drop is an opportunity to confront the fact that pianos are destroyed every day, and by putting the piano's destruction into a performance setting, we can find beauty in the process. After all, since we can no longer find beauty in the music of these pianos, if we are to find beauty in them at all, we must find beauty in their destruction.

Nelson vs. Nelson

Nelson vs. Nelson, for film canister, vocalist, and accompanying pit band; by Jonathon Wilcke.

Notes on Nelson vs. Nelson

Ostensibly, the film canister player does an impression of a wrestling match according to a script, while a vocalist reads through a long list of disjointed wrestling talk. Behind the canister and vocalist, a pit band plays a loose version of Miles Davis' Half Nelson.

In Nelson vs. Nelson, players cycle through three rule systems: standard notation (a revisioning of Miles Davis' Half Nelson), a numbered list of phrases, and a flow chart of techniques for playing the film canister. The conductor's cues are based on wrestling referee hand signals.

The expectation is that the rules shall evolve as the residue of one system rubs off onto the next while players cycle through.

I think of Nelson vs. Nelson as a metaphor for how social systems operate and how they evolve when they operate in proximity.

To make systemicity apparent, I use wrestling as a theme rather than overt references. For example, I'm thinking about team mentality in the white collar workplace, and conformism to capitalist value systems, as examples of social systems. Nelson vs. Nelson is both critical and hopeful: it wants to understand how capitalist conformity operates and it hopes that as the humans rotate through and transfer elements of one rule system to another the systems erode and abrade.
